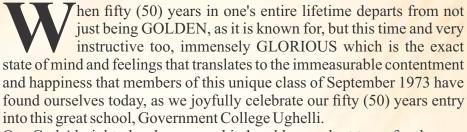
I crave your support and understanding for the OBA as we dream bigger dreams for our old school. We will call on you and we are assured you will respond because it is for a good cause.

ometimes I wonder if life did not start at GCU. I remember my life in primary school or before that era of rudimentary learning or awareness. Some episodes as toddler. Shirtless, short-less, scrambling about in underwear, sullied in mud, bathed in sand. Ecstatic nonetheless. It was life in a bubble, neither hope nor despair. Just in the moment, believing not in God but parent. Not even aware of belief, just lost in the beauty of toys and puckish delights. They sometimes occur to me as pre-life.

Going to Ughelli was my first real journey in life. We had left Lagos for Warri after the civil war. But it was as a family. We moved to Ibadan, also as a family. Now, my father Moses was taking me to Ughelli. The journey was about me and me alone. I was going there with him, but we were returning together in the first instance. In the second episode, he was returning alone. It was a baptismal experience in relocation. For the first time I was going to be alone, away from father, mother, family. I would live among strangers, under the care of men, or women, as teachers and guardians. People neither I nor my parents knew. I was being entrusted to institutional care. Parents were ceding their jobs to total strangers.

## **GCU** as guest

Yet, I was not sure I was leaving Ibadan after I completed my primary education. I had secured admission to a well-known secondary school in Ibadan. I was contemplating joining some friends I knew in a boarding house in the city.

But we had our goodbyes on the last days at Methodist Primary School. I had gained admission into Methodist High School, Ibadan. My father loved it for being a missionary school. A few days after, a classmate came to our home with an interview invitation to Edo College. My father said no dice. Ibadan was still it. Then a few days later, the same fellow came with another invitation. This time, for GCU. It was in a few days. I thought my father would dismiss it. When he read the letter, light draped his mien. Gradually, elation transformed into resolution. His forehead furrow transmitted the message.

"Oti," he deadpanned. "We are going to Ughelli." He was enamoured of GCU.

He had no job then. He had no money then. He had no idea how he was going to move his son to Ughelli, in another city, in another state, faraway. His head started to work. He was equipped only with hope and, of course, faith.

We did not have much time. The interview was in a matter of days. He had a few friends who were also members of the God's Kingdom Society. He contacted them. By sheer grace, one of them was travelling to Sapele for work. He was working in Lagos. We needed money only to take us to Ijebu Ode, where he would ferry us to Sapele. Between Sapele and Ughelli, was, in the circumstances, a piece of cake. A few naira notes here, a few there, he scrambled enough to put us on the road.

My father's friend, in his official car, a Volkswagen, paid for our meal at Ore, my first foray into pounded yam and grasscutter. It was a novel joy. It never occurred to my 12-year-old mind what adventure the old man was putting me into. I did not have the admission. The

whole adventure could be a bust. I did not contemplate it. Neither did he display any sense of a possible futility.

We arrived Ughelli a day before the interview, and we passed the night at the residence of the GKS station minister who hosted us. He had no idea we were coming. His hospitality was breathtaking. The next day, we went to campus. I was taken with the sheer sweep of its expanse, the sprawl of hostels, the meadows, the trees, the solemn air.

My father made friends with Igho Osoroh's father who took us in his Peugeot 304 car. Such an amiable fellow.

I was in Sapele House, I think. And the fellow I was close with then was who we know today as Pablo. That is, Martins Ohwo. We were in the same dormitory, and he was quite a fellow with his bonhomie and sense of humour. I recall him with the joke about A Rocky Joe Joe and A jimmy loker, phantom fellows he conjured in his bedside locker. My father was taken by his sense of fun.

We did the written test and were shortlisted for the oral interview. At night, in the rain and squall outside, J.E. Jones roared out our names. I recall Omatsola Vincent's name was called just before mine. Vincent was my primary school classmate in Warri. We were to meet again, in the same class at Ife. Just like Oladosun who, however, studied statistics and demography. And, of course, our dear Bishop Kwakpovwe.

That night, I was in the hostel among those who received their admission letters. I had not seen my dad. He was in town with the GKS cleric. Ohwo and I and a few others were rejoicing at our success when I saw my father, drenched all over but his eyes alert like a dreamer. He knew the admission slips had been handed out. Immediately I saw him, I flicked out my letter and twirled it up. The old man was like a little child.

We were returning that night to town, he declared nervously.

He was too overwhelmed. He kept saying, as we ploughed through the rain that night, that he was proud of me because I had not disgraced him. He had not come all the way with nothing in his pocket only to return empty handed.

We returned to Ibadan, and the news stirred the hearts of his friends, and the school fees and my upkeep money for a year were paid by his friends.

If I came to Ughelli the first time and returned with my dad, the second time, I was not to see him again for over two years. He was only waiting for me to secure admission and settle in Ughelli for him to leave Ibadan to kano in search of a job. We communicated through letters.

That was the beginning of my Ughelli sojourn, a sojourn that took me through humbling of fagging, the culinary paradise of obroshun, kum bohe, et al; and the barbarities of brine or no brine, et al. I made friends in the class like the subtle dignity of Matthew Uponi, footballing maestro of Ekajeh, the feisty Akangbou, the playful mischief of Agbro and Uduehi, the riproaring humour of Dominic Bomoh, budding erudition of Obanor and the gravity of of "always busy" Egbedi.

It was my time of growing up, of knowing society, of developing social tact, of the challenges of personal hygiene, dodging to town with Victor Agbro, enjoying and suffering from mashed rations, confronting the professions. I thought I was going to be a doctor in class one, a geologist in class three, a lawyer or economist in class four, and a lecturer or journalist in class five. Our teachers, like Demas Akpore – for poetry-, Ogbodume – for English), Eshareture and Edenya (for history) as well as Tieku – who made me realise cadences and audacity in writing - remain etched in my consciousness as I saw myself as a writer of some sort, a man who would wrestle with language as a mate and matter in my quest for bread and butter – and fame - in a hazy future.

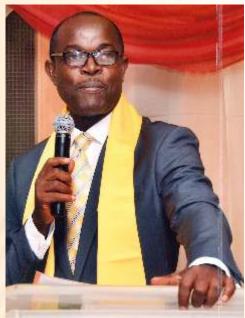








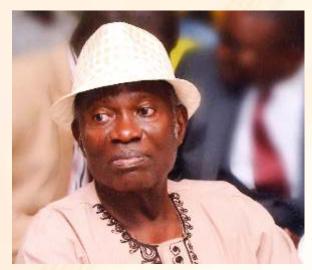






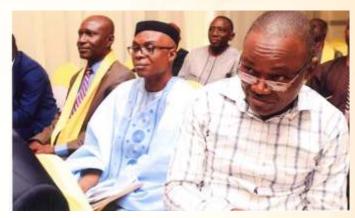




















### **Keep The Ship Sailing**
